

Mike Tredeau from the Burlington Historical Commission provided tours for Francis Wyman Elementary school and others on annual history day for third graders.

In August each year we participate in the Celebrate Burlington festivities on the common. We give kids (and adults) the opportunity to try writing with a quill pen and/or make clay marbles. Pam brought a copy of the 1640 Woburn Town Orders which includes signatures by John and Francis.

Wyman's Exchange, Central St, Lowell MA

This historic building was built in Lowell in 1833 by an eccentric Captain William Wyman. He developed other properties in Lowell including a concert hall and a church. He was named Lowell's second Postmaster General in 1829 by his idol, President Andrew Jackson. His life is not without controversy. He was involved in a court case that went all the way to the Massachusetts Supreme Court. Good thing he could afford Daniel Webster as his lawyer who got him acquitted. Wondering what crime he committed and where all his money went? To find out, come to the Wyman Annual Meeting on September 21, 2019!

Pioneer Gardening by Cathy Wyman Whooten

Francis and John Wyman were colonial pioneers who purchased the Wyman homestead property between 1655 and 1666. Francis married Abigail Reed and together they developed gardens with a purpose. Roses were grown for rose water used for medicinal purposes; edible purposes and fragrant purposes. Flax for spinning into linen for clothing, as well as linseed oil for tanning. There were berries for juice, jellies and linen dyes. Grasses and hay were grown for the animals; corn, rye, barley and wheat would be grown for food; and animals too. We know from Francis' will that flax gardens existed as he left Abigail "one-third parte of ye produce and ye farme.....of ye hopps, of the hemp and flax.."

As we go forward in the development of "gardens" around the Wyman homestead, we'll keep them gardens of purpose, not necessarily gardens of design. At the last annual meeting, we discussed the development of a flax garden behind the barn as a new project in keeping with the spirit of pioneer gardening.

When making your decision to contribute to the Wyman Association, please consider as one of your reasons, the reconstruction of the Wyman gardens into "pioneer gardens of purpose", so the flax garden behind the barn can be developed, along with future gardens of roses, hopps and hemp on the property.

Our great historic architect, John Goff is retiring to embark on the next chapter of his life and will be moving out of Salem to summer in Maine and winter in Florida. John has provided dedicated, thoughtful and creative services to the FWA for over 20 years. He saved our beloved house from the ashes after the devastating fire and oversaw two significant preservation projects. He researched our history, planned the restoration approach and wrote successful applications obtaining Mass Historic Commission matching grants. Then he designed the repairs, led the selection of contractors and oversaw the work. The first project repaired the house structure and made it weather tight. The second project restored the stair hall and the kitchen floor making the house safe for tours again. He has continued to provide thoughtful preservation insights for our ongoing programs. 

Annual Meeting 2018

We lost a great friend and supporter in May. Norman Biggart was the chairman of the Burlington Historical commission when the fire threatened the house. He was very instrumental in garnering the town's monitory support for our restorations back in 1996. Norm passed away at the age of 97. His entire life was devoted to exploration, learning, and doing for others. He served as a photographer in India in the Army Air Corps during WWII. He went on to become an expert in experimental photography and worked on a team that photographed the first hydrogen bomb explosions in Nevada and the Pacific. He was also very involved in mineralogy and of course history and historic preservation. He left us a sizeable donation for which we are very grateful. We will miss his interesting observations and his steadfast support.
