Dear Family and Friends,

Pandemic 2020! The world has been dealing with the Covid-19 pandemic. Schools are closed and the economy shut down. FWA followed suit with no monthly open houses and no other tours. We held our board meeting by a zoom video conference call for the first time.

During the meeting we discussed projects and determined to pursue four projects immediately: Replace the cedar shingle roof, repair the shed, construct a well sweep, and restore the association room. I am in contact with a contractor and an architect to determine the approach and pricing.

Massachusetts is currently in phase 3 of the pandemic recovery which allows outdoor gatherings up to 50 people outside or 25 inside. Face masks are required when 6' social distancing is not possible. We decided to hold a modified annual meeting on Saturday, October 3rd. Due to travel restrictions and quarantine requirements, we are only expecting people from the New England States and lessor numbers than in recent years. It will be a working party, so if you are within a drive away, bring

your yard tools and work gloves to help us make some improvements to the property.

We started some yard improvement activities already and have removed the wood piles, relocated the outhouse, cleaned up along the street and started a garden plot out behind the shed. The Minuteman Sportsman's Club provided the support to brush hog an area for the garden. We'll continue these projects during the annual meeting in October, clearing brush, raking the yard, and additional clearing on the stone wall by the street. The objective by the street is to make the house more visible and appealing from the street.

William Wyman family. This banker and businessman found himself with embezzlement charges but thanks to Daniel Webster, the Captain was acquitted on appeal. Once charges were dismissed, his disgraced family returned from Baltimore.

The returning family included his, soon to be famous, granddaughter - Sarah Wyman Whitman. Influenced by the 28,000 mill girls working in Lowell, Sarah was determined to not live a vacuous wealthy woman's life. She was one of the first women to own her own art studio and stained glass company, Lily Glass Works. She started several organizations that have survived today: the School of the Museum of Fine Arts at Tufts University and the Society of Arts and Crafts at the Seaport in Boston. She was also known in the publishing world for her thoughtful book cover designs and I recently learned she designed several graves for friends and family, mostly at the Mt. Auburn Cemetery.

Benjamin Farnsworth Wyman Desk

We are very fortunate to be receiving a donation of our founder's family desk. Benjamin Farnsworth Wyman, 1839 to 1927, organized a meeting of Wyman's in 1899.

They witnessed the decrepit condition of the house and determined to save it for future generations. As a commercial traveler for the Leatheroid Mfg. Co. of Kennebunk, Maine, he was able to contact Wymans across the country and generate interest and support to buy the house and form the FWA, incorporated in 1902.

Benjamin's great-great granddaughter, Susan Howison had been entrusted with the desk and is now donating it to the FWA and we will place it in the Association Room (1st floor SE corner) as a tribute to the founder of the FWA.
