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Dear Family and Friends,

In the third year of the Covid pandemic, things have opened up a bit and many people are ready to venture out. We had a Spring meeting in May to celebrate preservation month and our new shed. The June open house had over 50 visitors. It was great to have family and friends on site to see our progress and hear our plans.

In the Fall, we completed the work to plaster the walls and ceiling in the Association Room as well as trim out the windows. It's quite an improvement and really highlights our displays in that room.

In February and March, we pretty much replaced the 120 year old shed that the FWA founders built to support their original restoration of the house. The contractor, Matt Diana, Housewright took great pains to try and reuse old timbers and other materials but things were so rotten, we were only able to salvage some of the roof sheathing and the relatively new posts on the west side.

The finished product is very substantial and should last us for several generations. We now have some space to meet out of the weather.

Our stained glass window repair project has been significantly delayed due to material delays cause by the Covid epidemic. The special order glass arrived in June and our window is finally on the table in the shop being repaired.

In addition to repairing the glass they will be improving the structure of the metal frame. We plan to mount it back into the window frame it was in and display it in the SW bedroom. Maybe it will be complete by the annual meeting on September 17th?

The wellsweep project is moving along. We are working with our architect Greg Colling of Merrimack Design; the contractor, Matt Diana Housewright; and Marty Dudek an archeologist to bring this to fruition.



Marty's company, Commonwealth Heritage Group has completed the "dig". This week Marty reported that "we have a lot of artifacts from the project that are being processed. They have been washed and dried and are being catalogued

right now. We have numerous ceramic fragments with a variety of 17th to 19th century British ceramic types, North Devon earthenware (17h c.), Staffordshire earthenware (1670-1795), white salt-glazed stoneware (1720-1775), creamware (1762-1820) and pearlware (1779-1830), as well as numerous lead-glazed redware fragments that span the whole colonial period up to the mid 1800s. Most of these are small fragments but they indicate a long use of the yard as would be expected. We have a complete tobacco pipe bowl and a slate pencil among interesting finds. Once we have the cataloguing complete, we can complete the report and turn that into the MHC." The report to Massachusetts Historic Commission needs to be submitted and considered before we can continue with any digging.

Tidbits from the early years of Francis & John by Caroline Miller.

December 18, 1640, Francis, John, & 3 uncles were among the 32 who signed town orders forming Charlestown Village (Woburn). "It is required that all persons admitted to be Inhabitance in the said town shall by voluntary Agreement subscribe to these Orders following..."

I don't know why he [Francis] doesn't appear on the petition incorporating Charlestown Village as Woburn, but it wasn't necessary that he do so. He was already fully vested in the settlement. He is surprisingly absent from the election of officers. Most inhabitants were called upon to serve at one time or another. He served as constable in 1655 along with John, who was also elected surveyor of highways in 1654, and commissioner for the county rate in 1656, 1672, and 1682.

Perhaps his Baptist sympathies and the hint of a rebellious spirit held him back. His focus was on acquiring land, pursuing his business, and other entrepreneurial pursuits--and he wasn't reluctant to protect his interests in court, (a tad litigious). By 1671 he was paying the highest tax rate in the town, and when he died, he and John were among the largest landowners. Again, perhaps due to his Baptist leanings he wasn't made freeman until he was almost 40.
